It seemed to me that the Royal London was not geared to accommodate a large group as I had to persuade them that it was possible to charge individually rather than issue a bulk invoice to our Club, which was their preferred option.

The return journey was much more comfortable with tide and wind both driving west.

As usual Tyrrick turned into Newtown for a quiet picnic and thus missed access to her berth.

It was agreed that I try to arrange trips to the Master Builder at Bucklers Hard and the Royal Victoria Yacht Club.

Terry Bishop has suggested that we try Ashlett Creek next year. It is almost opposite the Hamble, is accessible for about four hours, and has a very good pub. The last was echoed by several other members who have visited.
